4TH QUARTER FOCUS Survey Results and Next Steps

Years ago, my grandparents began showing signs of aging. It was barely noticeable at first. A slight dip in energy, motivation, and activity.

My grandparents had been so active in the various ministries of their church that it was easy for my family to assume their slow-down in participation might be their changing interest and passion from one ministry to another as they sometimes would do. But this time something was different. Their lives were beginning to change, and I don't think either they or I were ready for the realities that might entail.

For my part, I was in denial about it—until I wasn't—and then I assumed they would need much more assistance than they really did. For my grandparents, the losses came very gradually and at very unpredictable intervals. Truth be told, they were both reasonably high functioning until the last year of their lives. As I reflect on my time with them and conversations we had about how they were doing, I realized we often talked past each other. I voiced my concerns; they voiced their assurance. I wonder now if there could have been a different way.

Hearing the 4th Quarter questions

It has been nine months since we convened our 4th Quarter Forum in the fellowship hall. Some of you were at that forum; others have joined the conversation since. As we've continued to shape our language of the 4th Quarter, we have realized this is primarily a season marked by the move from independence to dependence. We believe that as difficult as this time is to live through, it can be a season of profound spiritual transformation. It has been our experience that in order to reach the spiritual

questions, you must first lean into the practical ones. So, we have asked practical questions about this 4th Quarter, trusting they will lead us to the space of transformation.

In these months, we have been in conversation with people who can help us give form to a vision for where we go from here. We've reached out to our friends at Liminal Space, we've had conversation with other churches, and we've engaged in prayer and discernment as we sought to hone our next steps. We'd like to update you on where that conversation has led us and what we have on the calendar right now.

4th Quarter Survey results

A few weeks ago, we sent a survey to everyone actively connected to Calvin. We were encouraged that **42 of you chose to respond** and give us some very good feedback. More than half of you said that you would benefit from some sort of caregiver support group. As a result, we are running a **short-term caregiver support group** this summer to find out even better how we might support people who are functioning in the role of caregiver during this season of their lives. Our hope is that this group will help to inform how we support caregivers through Calvin in the future.

Another significant survey result was that the vast majority of you felt that you could use **education and resourcing** for the 4th Quarter. We were incredibly pleased to learn that there is a conference in Shoreline already planned for next spring that will address exactly these topics. This **conference in March 2019 at Shoreline Community Church** will focus on resources and education for those living in, and facing the challenges of, aging. This conference will feature nationally renowned speaker and educator **Teepa Snow** who provides excellent content and training on dementia and memory loss.

The third piece of feedback from the survey that we heard has to do with each other. It impressed us that many of you resonated with the idea that a conference or workshop might deepen relationships with each other, strengthening the fiber of our community as we journey through aging together. How we have conversations with each other matters, and perhaps we could all use a little coaching and assistance in how to have them. To this end, we are pursuing a proposal to host a **one-day workshop at Calvin in the fall of 2018 on how we navigate 4th Quarter conversations together**. Potential topics include:

I am humbled to be a part of living as an active continuation of the Bible. See, even though I had hooked-on-phonics and can pronounce the relatively difficult "Tychicus", I think it's best pronounced "Toko", or "Meggan", or "Michael", or "Cade".

Knowing where God has brought our four youth over the span of their lives is encouraging and exciting. Even more so are the possibilities for their futures! When you first left home (whether identifying as a Christian or not), what impact did you bear on the world around you? Who sent you off? Perhaps a mentor or parent telling you how to behave in the world. It is our prayer that you, too, may participate, like Paul, in sending these youth off to their next chapter, and that we as a church continue to find ways to encourage them as they encourage others.

Ian Parrilla

Why I teach Sunday school year after year

This year we have been blessed again with amazing teachers and ambassadors, those serving monthly alongside teachers. People teach—or don't teach—Sunday school for many reasons.

Maybe you taught when your kids were little, and now want others to do the same. Maybe you had a special Sunday school teacher growing up and want to be that for someone else. Never having attended Sunday school, you may not feel equipped; or because you weren't equipped, you feel you could be the one equipping children. After a long week of work, teaching could sound exhausting; or after a long week of work, teaching is your fulfilling, happy place.

One thing many of our teachers have learned is that, really, we are not the ones teaching. We are vessels of God's love and wisdom, making ourselves available to His calling to love others with His power, and grace.

Partnering with families to raise a generation for Christ is our entire church's responsibility. Each person plays a part on some level. Teaching Sunday school is one place where God can use our gifts. While some teach for a year and then feel called to another ministry, **Ian Parrilla** has taught our preschoolers for over 15 years!

Ian and her family, husband Benjie, sons Benj and Pietro and daughter Lora, migrated to the United States from the Philippines in 2000-2001. Currently, Ian works full time as a Financial Analyst at Precor, Inc. Her husband Benjie works at Boeing, Benj attends Seattle University, Pietro attends George Fox, and Lora is a high school freshman at Edmonds Homeschool.

The Parrilla family began attending Calvin 15 years ago after they were invited by member Kay Bartholomew. Shortly after becoming members, Ian began teaching Sunday school in 2005. Ian remembers that "growing up, Sunday school was so much part of me. I acknowledge that it was one of the ways that the church helped my parents in nurturing my spiritual growth. This is my way of giving back".

Teaching Sunday school is not the only way Ian serves. She also is part of our Family Ministry Team, and this year she joined and sings in our choir. Often times you will see the Parrilla family serving together cleaning the grounds, decorating for an event,



leading worship, or packing food backpacks, among other things. As a family, the Parrillas also try to give back to the Philippines in their own little ways.

One of the best parts of teaching Sunday school for Ian is "the ... humbling feeling that, despite my imperfections, God is using me as an instrument to show His love to the little ones. It also makes me accountable as I teach the lesson, to try to walk the talk."

When asked about rewarding moments of teaching Ian mentions two: "Every time we sing our welcome song, (we sing it for each child and we end the song with the child's name), I love the look on the children's faces as they anticipate their turn when we sing their name." "There is also the eagerness of the children to share their thoughts" (as they try to relate to the story/lesson).

Each week Ian spends approximately an hour and a half preparing her lesson, including classroom set up. She continues to teach Sunday school because, "It is the ministry that God has put in my heart to be involved in. As long as I have the calling, I will continue to teach."

Ian's hope for kids and families is that that the experience goes beyond the craft or art work, or the playtime that we have. "In the short time we have together, even though the lesson may not sink in at that time, more than anything else, I pray that they feel loved and valued by me, our congregation, and by our great God. For the parents, I pray that they feel loved and supported by the church as they nurture their children."

For the last year, Ian has enjoyed the flexibility of sharing the class with a partner, alternating weeks with another teacher. Ian would love to continue having a partner teach our preschoolers every other week. **Teaching Sunday school doesn't require experience.** If you are curious and feel God's nudging, and love God and his children, Ian and I would love to talk with you about this opportunity to partner with parents to raise this generation to know and love Christ.

JUNE OUTREACH FOCUS

Who Coordinates Calvin's Outreach Efforts?

The Outreach Coordinating Team

Pray. Grow. Serve.

We frequently have these three banners at the front of the sanctuary, and we often talk about these three components of the Christian life.

This framework is further reinforced by our Vision statement:

"We gather to **worship** in Spirit and truth,
grow toward maturity in Christ, and
spread God's love to our neighborhoods and in the world."

Notice that the highlighted words are what grammarians would call "action verbs." Each requires action on our part! The Outreach Team is focused on the final of these three – **Serving** by reaching out to our world to spread God's love.

Calvin has historically had a strong commitment to missions outreach in our community and around the world. Without a staff person to coordinate our mission efforts, Calvin relies on a small Outreach Team focused on helping the congregation be well-informed and actively involved in serving and sharing God's love.

For each Outreach partner, we have a volunteer-created Action Team. The role of the Action Team is to be a strong liaison between our congregation and those actively engaged in the mission.

We ask the Action Teams to stay aware of the needs and accomplishments of our mission partners, to share those with the rest of us, and help us see how we each can be more involved. We hope you have noticed that at least once each year, we all get an update on each of our mission partners – including a presentation from the pulpit, an article in *Connections*, an informational bulletin board, and perhaps an additional activity such as a dinner or service opportunity.

Our Action Teams are a way for all of us to carry out the "Serve" part of our opportunity as Christians. Here's a list of our Outreach partners, along with a contact name from the Action Team:

Shoreline faith community coordinates support for Ronald Commons through RCFA

A number of Shoreline-area churches, including Calvin, have formed the **Ronald Commons Faith Alliance (RCFA)** to provide a welcoming, supportive community for the individuals and families who live there. Founding partner **Compass Housing Alliance** continues to coordinate services for Ronald Commons residents, including support for the Faith Alliance. Meetings are held every other month.

Even without an Action Team for Ronald Commons (RC), Calvin representatives have continued to attend the meetings to assess if and how we might best be involved. There is one particular parallel with Calvin—we both have a Summer Community Block Party! This year they will be one month apart.

Unlike at Calvin, parking at RC is very limited, so **Calvin's bus**, driven by a Calvin bus driver, **could be put to good use shuttling party-goers to and from nearby parking lots**. If you are trained and willing to give an hour or two driving Calvin's bus on July 21, please contact John Claus.

We say at Calvin that we care about those on margins—especially those who are hungry and homeless. Residents at Ronald Commons are fortunate to have the basics, but very little more. What is Ronald Commons?

Ronald Commons is a unique partnership between **Ronald United Methodist Church**, **Compass Housing Alliance**, and **Hopelink** who collaborated to build 60 units of affordable housing, with on-site support services including 12,000 square feet for a food bank and new service center for Hopelink's Shoreline operations. It is located just a mile SE of Calvin near Shorewood High School.


