#### Growing My Faith Through Hospitality

When I was growing up in Seattle. my parents were always entertaining. On Saturdays, my mom would bake fresh bread or a pie to get ready for the next day. On Sunday mornings, she would put a roast in the oven before leaving for church, and then she and my dad would look around the congregation to see if there were new visitors to invite for Sunday dinner. It would be common to have ten people around the table each week. She made it look easy (maybe because she grew up in a large farming family in Minnesota), but my parents were always interested in meeting new people and making friends. At her memorial service, Mike asked the congregation to raise their hand if they had ever eaten a meal at Don and Pauline's home, and nearly everyone in the service of over 200 put their hands up.

When Mike and I got married, we wanted to follow their example and have our home be a place of hospitality to others, but we chose a different day of the week. It was hard to get three small kids to church on time, let alone prepare a Sunday meal! For me, being hospitable to people, both those I know and strangers that cross my path, has been one of the most lifechanging and spiritually rewarding steps of faith I have ever experienced. God has shown me how our home can be used by Him and for His purposes. He may use us to help visitors, and He may also use visitors to guide and direct our own lives. Two major examples come to mind.

A few years ago, Judy Runions Green asked me if I would be willing to host a couple of college kids from South Africa in our home for a few weeks while they were taking a course at the UW Bothell campus. To be honest, I wasn't very excited about the idea, but decided to say yes. John Henry and Johan came to stay, and it was a delightful time. They were loads of fun, and we had a great time showing them around the city, as well as learning about life in South Africa. One day, John Henry missed his ride, and I told him I could take him to class after we finished breakfast. As we were eating, I asked him to tell me about his family. To my amazement, this young man broke down in heaving sobs and told me his story. He had grown up in a loving Christian home, never missing any church services. Somehow, though, his father had got mixed up with another woman and had left the family, leading his mother to fall into a deep depression. She committed suicide while he was away at college. John Henry felt deep despair that he had not been with her, and, to make matters worse, his grandmother told him that his mother would not be in heaven because of this sin. For the next two hours, I talked to John Henry about the nature of depression, and that it was an illness. I told him that her death wasn't his fault, and his mother was still loved by God. He listened intently and thanked me for that encouragement. After I dropped him off at his classes later that day, I sat in my car, stunned by the realization that God had sent this grieving young man to our home for help, all the way from South Africa. We still keep in touch today, and he calls me his "American" mom.

A second example illustrates how God uses visitors to influence our direction. While our son, Stewart, was a junior at Shorewood and beginning to research colleges to attend, our younger kids were attending King's Middle School. A call went out to parents to host some choir kids from Azusa Pacific University who were in town. I think we had at least four college kids sleeping downstairs one night. The next morning, they invited me to come to their concert. I attended, and was blown away by their musical ability, as well as their Christian witness. I told Stewart we needed to add that university to our list of places to check out. It turned out both of our sons would eventually attend there.

Not all my experiences hosting people have been quite so dramatic, but I am always blessed to meet people from different countries or situations and become friends with them over a meal. Maybe this experience is like that of the early church. For over 300 years, Christians met in homes and shared meals together. There were no church buildings. It must have been the way that the Church grew so guickly. As Peter writes in 1 Peter 4:9, "Cheerfully share your home with those who need a meal or a place to stay." In our world that has so much divisiveness and loneliness, a simple meal and a cup of tea truly can be the greatest witness of the love of Christ.
