O Holy Night

It was an ordinary evening two thousand years ago. The stars were beginning to flicker in the night sky; weary travelers rushed to find lodging for the night, shepherds prepared for the night watch, and in a far land wise men set their sights on the night sky. Nothing unusual about this night or was there?

Suddenly, the shepherds are startled by a voice and a heavenly host praising God, declaring the birth of a baby Jesus. Confused and excited, they leave their sheep to go see this child in a humble manger with his mother, Mary. Joseph is beaming nearby. In a far-off land three wise men watch the night sky and see a star they know as a sign of the birth of the King, and they, too, go to adore Jesus.

Zoom forward two thousand years to a large church packed full of people on Christmas Eve, to a little girl sitting on the main floor with her family and friends. They have sung all the songs of Christmas, and as is the custom, the choir rises, the organ begins the prelude and then a single soprano, in the clearest voice, begins to sing, "O Holy Night, the stars are brightly shining, it is the night of our dear Savior's birth." This is the moment she has waited for, that she's clutched her little candle for. As the music is sung a flame is passed from one person to another until finally her candle, too, is lit. The room is dark except for a thousand candles twinkling like the stars that were in that night sky two thousand years ago. It's magical, wondrous, and humbling. Jesus the light of the world is born.

As she listens the choir joins their voices with the soprano in telling the story of Jesus' birth, God's own Son. She is filled with the wonder and excitement of His birth. That feeling is as real to her today as it was on Christmas Eve long ago.
