- When you were a child, what did you do when you didn't get your way at home, school, or among your friends?
- Read *Jonah 4:1-4*. What has happened in the first three chapters of the story to cause Jonah to be so displeased and angry?
- Given what has transpired, what might you have felt in Jonah's place? How would you characterize Jonah's response?
- Read *Exodus 34:6-7*. How is Jonah's description of God similar to the LORD's self-revelation to Moses? How is it different? *(Optional: How does Jonah's use of this confession compare to Neh. 9:17, Pss. 86:15; 103:8; 145:8; and Joel 2:12-13?)*
- Why does Jonah ask the LORD to take his life? What would Jonah gain by dying?
- Why does the LORD respond to Jonah with a question rather than a rebuke? What does the LORD's question lead Jonah to do?
- What does Jonah's anger reveal about Jonah's heart and about his understanding of God's mercy?
- What have you found yourself getting angry with God about? How would you respond if God asked you, "Is it good for you to be angry?"
- Where have you limited God's mercy to others and even to yourself? How do you sense God challenging to you respond differently, and what will you do? How can your small group or others pray for you and support you in this?
